BOY SCOUT CAMP

Boy Scouts attending Camp Seton participated in a number of different activities throughout the Summer. Many boys may have had the opportunity to complete requirements for multiple ranks and merit badges.

This list is a sample of the many requirements that a Scout may have worked on throughout the Summer. This list however is not proof of mastery of a requirement, nor completion of one and a Scoutmaster should use their discretion when crediting a Scout with the completion of any requirement. Also, counselors at Camp Seton have not signed handbooks for any of the indicated requirements.

We suggest this list be used as a guide and an starting point. If a Scout would claim completion of any requirement, surely he could produce evidence as such. For instance, if a Scout claims he did indeed complete Requirement # 6 at Camp Seton- he should still be able to demonstrate how to properly fold an American Flag.

Merit Badge "partials" are available for the listed Merit Badges. If a Scout wishes to receive a blue card, partially completed- he should first speak to his Scoutmaster and then either the Scoutmaster or the Scout with the Scoutmasters permission should contact the Greenwich Council for the blue cards.

CUB SCOUT CAMP

Cub Scouts attending Camp Seton participated in lots of different activities throughout the Summer. Each day they used the buddy system and started off the morning the same way, with a flag ceremony. Reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and the Cub Scout Promise at the flag ceremony was also a daily ritual. Sometime Scouts also recited the Law of the Pack and exchanged the Cub Scout handshake.

The daily opening ceremony at Camp Seton was a great first step towards completing the Bobcat Rank and the flag raising was almost always completed by a Webelos Den. Though a Cub Scout Den Leader and Webelos Den Leader should use this list as a guide and not as definitive proof of a completed requirement.

At the end of the last Friday of every two week session an awards campfire presented each camper in attendance an envelope of cards for each of the belt loops they earned and a Camp Seton patch, contact Greenwich Council if you have a Scout that didn't get their cards.
